CITIZEN SURVEY FINDINGS REPORT









t local government level, there is a particular need to ensure that participation in the integrated development planning (IDP) processes is deliberative, with citizens being involved in identifying and resolving trade-offs rather than simply developing shopping lists of needs. Chapter 4 of the Municipal Systems Act obliges a municipality to create the systems, mechanisms and enabling conditions for meaningful participation of the community in the affairs of the municipality beyond the IDP process, including in monitoring and reviewing municipal performance. The Act requires councilors and officials to play a key role in fostering community participation. However, while structures such as ward committees have been created to enable councilors and officials to engage with communities, these have not worked in the manner intended. Interactions are often formulaic and symbolic rather than meaningful and have generally not helped to strengthen links between communities and councilors. On the contrary, many councilors have become estranged from communities and their critical concerns. The link between councilors and citizens via the ward committee system needs to be improved. This could be addressed through the translation of IDPs into ward-level service improvement plans that respond to the specific needs of each ward. Additionally, greater emphasis needs to be placed on ensuring two-way communication and interaction that enables citizens to express their needs and concerns as well as for citizens to be kept informed by councilors of key issues and developments that are underway in the ward." About this report

These are the findings of a community survey conducted in the Umsobomvu Local Municipality (Pixley Ka Seme District, Northern Cape) to support the Integrated Developing Planning (IDP) process.


This project is a joint initiative led by the municipality, the Office of the Premier, the Department of Planning, Monitoring and Evaluation (DPME) and provincial departments. It applies the citizen-based monitoring model to enhance participation of community members in the IDP process, improve cooperation with


provincial sector departments and enable ward level monitoring of delivery against the plan.


The survey provides detailed picture of community priorities—the top three being taring & paving of roads, housing and employment.

This data is presented to support the discussions, negotiations and trade-off that are necessary for an integrated development plan that best responds to the needs of citizens.

Methodology

A team of 110 community members were trained and carried out the door-to-door survey in the six wards of Umsobomvu. The training was done by DPME's Citizen-Based Monitoring team, who together with the Office of the Premier provided support and quality control during the survey.

This team of surveyors comprised Ward Councillors. Ward Committee members.

Community Work Programme (CWP) participants, and Community Development Workers (CDWs). The survey took place from 13 -17 February 2017. A total of 6234 community members participated. (The survey form can be seen on the following page.)

The questionnaire, data capture and analysis system used were developed specifically for this exercise. This was the first application of the CBM

model in the local government space.
The data capturing and analysis was done by a team of DPME officials. The open ended responses were coded against a list of 177 unique priority codes. The analysis was done using MS

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

Survey findings — Knowledge of the IDP Process

Do you know what the Integrated Development Plan (IDP) is?

The responses show that there is a significant variation across the wards. Ward 2 (77,5%) and Ward 6B (76,8%) show the highest positive responses, whereas Ward 3, Ward 4, Ward 5 and Ward 6 all show low levels of knowledge of the IDP. There needs to be attention given to these wards to communicate what the IDP is.


Overall, 62% of the survey respondents had not heard of the IDP.



Have you been part of the IDP consultation process initiated by the municipality?


When it comes to participation in IDP consultations the responses follow a similar trend as above. Again, Wards 3, 4, 5 and 6 show low levels of participation in the IDP consultations, especially when compared to Wards 1, 2 and 6B.


Overall, 68.5% of the survey respondents had not participated in IDP consultations.



Overview of responses to question: "What should government prioritise in your area?"

Analysis of the data showing the top categories of responses. Each category is contains a number of priorities (Overall the top five categories of priorities are Road and Transport, Housing, Jobs and Money, Water and Sanitation. These categories however do not give much detail. For example the Roads and Transport category is by far made up of calls for tarring and paving of roads. Similarly the Housing category is dominated by requests for RDP houses. For more detail see the breakdowns of the categories starting on page 9.







This analysis of responses by categories, presents each of the wards separately. The darker red shows higher numbers of response.



Roads and transport; housing


#1—Roads and transport. The issue that makes this category number one is calls for taring or paving roads. This is a priority across the wards, with Eurekaville, Dry Location and Khayelitsha getting the highest number of responses in this category. The 2nd priority was street lights, with Ward 3 featuring prominently with over 200 responses (Operation Vula, Towervallei and Zwelitsha. The 3rd biggest issue was need for bridges and access roads. Here Ward 3 featured prominently, with half of the responses coming from Operation Vula.



#2—Housing. By far the biggest number of responses in this category was people wanting RDP houses. This was common across wards and no one area or ward stands out. Second was people complaining that the roofs of their RDPs were leaking, particularly in Lowryville (ward 4), Kwazamuxolo (ward 1) and Zwelitsha in ward 3.




Jobs and money; sanitation




#3—Jobs and Money: The 3rd biggest priority was for government to create employment. This call was from across all wards. Some people suggested that skills training and job centres could assist

#4—Sanitation: Installation of sewage system was a high priority, especially in Dry Location and New Brighton. Operation Vula, Old Location and other areas. Fixing toilets was a priority in Bongweni, Kwazamuxolo and Lowryville.




Education; water


#5—Education: Top issue was request for schools. Reimvasmaak, Toto Mayoba and New Oubox had the highest's number of people calling for access to schools. Early childhood development was also a high priority, especially in Towervallei, Reimvasmaak and New Oubox.





#6—Water: Kwazamuxulo stood out in terms of calls for water. Colesberg, Khayelitsha, Operation Vula and Plakkerskamp also featured with requests for water



Health; Safety




Recreational facilities, electricity; geysers




#9— Recreational facilities: The number of people wanting recreational facilities was high, particularly in Lowryville, Towervallei and Kwazamuxolo.

#11—Geysers: The responses were evenly distributed across the wards.






#12— Retail and banking: the need for a shopping centre was in Ward 1 and 2.



#13—Solid waste: the majority of respondents who wanted a dump site were in Ward 3









Analysis of responses to question "Do you want to be part of monitoring service delivery in your ward?"

These charts show how many people said they wanted to be part of monitoring service delivery. Most of these provided a cell number and this will be very useful resource for ongoing communication in this process.

The three charts on the right show how the different age groups responded. We can see that in wards 4 and 5 there are higher numbers of people who don't want to be part of monitoring. This should be investigated further.
